ORD'S NON-COM CLUB MOVES TO SITE FORMERLY OCCUPIED BY OFFICERS CLUB

Last Monday marked the opening of the NCO Club's new location in the building formerly occupied by the ORD Officers Club. The new club is believed to be one of the largest night clubs in the south, with eating and dancing facilities for hundreds of strippers.

When the Non-Commissioned Officers' Club began operation in December of 1943, they occupied a small building adjoining the Squadron "A" orderly room. Thousands of non-coms danced and enjoyed themselves there.

Sergeant Alfred S. Foster, secretary-treasurer of the club stated yesterday that kitchen facilities will not be able to begin functioning until sometime next week, and that there would be dancing every night.

Tech-sergeant Marshall Sharp is the elected president of the club, with Staff-sergeant A.M. Wilson acting as general manager.
