High School Athletic Report Draws Praise From Rotarians

G. B. Phillips Gets Vote of Thanks After R. W. Glenn Tells of Far-reaching Program For Boys and Girls—Club Wants More Support For A. and T. College.

The Greensboro Rotary club Tuesday passed a resolution of thanks to G. B. Phillips, principal of the high school, for a report on school athletics, and of approval of the policy and practice outlined, after having heard the report; another resolution petitioning the legislature to make more nearly adequate provision for the negro Agricultural and Technical college than the budget committee recommends, and arranged for representation in behalf of the college's needs before a legislative committee tomorrow. Members will also

write—many have already done so—personal appeals to chairmen of the appropriations committees and others.

The A. and T. college glee club, about 30 men, sang for the Rotarians half a dozen folk songs, two quartet numbers, the former including "O, Mary Don't You Weep," "Rise and Shine," "Eve'ybody Talkin' 'Bout Hev'n Ain't Gwine There," "Ese Done Whut You Tol' Me to Do," "Lord, I Want to Be a Christian," and "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot."

A magnificent volume of melody,

admirable training, some voices of outstanding quality, enough talent for half a dozen minstrel choruses, especially effective pianissimo climaxes, each number received applause as hearty as the singing itself, and at the close the club rose in thanks for the entertainment.

The Phillips report was read by R. W. Glenn, and is as follows:

"The following statement is being made regarding the athletic work in the high school, in response to a feeling that has been expressed that the citizens of Greensboro would like to know what is being attempted and how successfully that is being carried out.

"Greensboro's plan is unusual in certain respects. Some schools it is true, throughout the state, are following the same idea, but thus far the facts have not shown that any school is doing as well as Greensboro. Many of the schools are having more successful regular teams but seem not to be reaching so many of the student body.

"The purpose of this outline is to show the advantages to be given by group or mass activities, as opposed to a few highly trained teams. In issuing this program there is no spirit of faultfinding for those schools that promote by one team. It is necessary under the present public spirit to have a show team. In developing the plan in Greensboro there is no question but what eventually this show team will be much more effective than under the old system. Under the mass system, large numbers of students are trained in athletics so that finally they become better players on the show team. The advantage can be easily seen when it is realized that large numbers of people are being developed. The outline will deal with boys' work under the four main points—football, basketball, baseball, track.

"During the latter part of August and up until the latter part of December, a conservative estimate of 127 boys took part in some form of football, as directed by the high school. While it is true that many of these boys did not get individual coaching, they played supervised football. The team which was developed as the school team was rated as one of the leading teams of the state at the end of the season. The program for next year will be more successful because of the activities during the past fall.

"In basketball, at least 85 boys have been playing regularly. A class schedule is in operation now, in which a number of games are being played. The two big first and second squads have been maintained throughout the season with scheduled games for both groups. Basketball is being put on the basis of successful training of the younger boys. It is not a one-year sport by any means, but boys must grow up with it.

"In baseball the plan of the high school is to develop 10 or 12 regular teams, including the regular squad. This program of development is well under way at present.

"Track squads have been organized and are meeting regularly. This sport offers large possibilities because of the fact that any size boy has an opportunity to train himself, and is not handicapped because of that fact. The Civitan club has been asked to promote a spring track meet for the western section of North Carolina. There are possibilities in this venture.

"This summarizes the activities of the boys in organized sport. (I should have said under football, that regular scheduled games were played by the second team, with other schools.)

"The State Association of High School Athletics for Girls is primarily a Greensboro high school product. It was initiated in this school and put into operation here. The state

cents per month fee for any student who belongs, entitles that student to admission to all games for the month. This ought to amount to \$2 per student for the nine months. It actually does not however, because the ideal situation does never develop.

"Plays and entertainments are sometimes resorted to.

"Gate receipts usually meet the travelling expenses. Occasionally, donations are made.

"Since the fall of 1921, it has not been necessary to get from outside sources more than the following amount: Camp and Playground association loaned the school \$220 to finish up the baseball season last spring. The Civitan club has recently paid the rental of Neese Hall, amounting to \$100. All other items have been met by the school.

"There was on hand at the beginning of this fall, \$725 worth of equipment. There has been added during the fall, \$350 worth, most of this equipment is of a permanent nature.

"This in brief, is an outline of what the Greensboro high school is trying to do.

"The following suggestion has been made and seems to be wise: The school athletic association feels that an advisory council composed of one member from each of the following clubs, would serve as a good balance wheel for the association: A member from the Rotary, Civitan, Kiwanis, Lions, chamber of commerce, and Camp and Playground association. These could form a committee for the purpose of passing upon any outside aid that might be asked. With the approval of this group, it would be fair to ask for money from any organization that should see fit to consider donations."

Superintendent Archer of the city schools spoke of the profound influence this movement is having throughout the state, as well as in Greensboro, under the leadership of Mr. Phillips, and moved a rising vote of thanks and of confidence. The club decided to appoint a representative to an advisory council as suggested. Mr. Archer also moved that the club send a delegation to Raleigh in the interest of the A. and T. college. Mayor Kiser will head this committee. A resolution to be sent to the legislative committeemen was adopted on motion of John N. Wilson, a number of of the Rotarians having expressed the hope that Greensboro will support the college in every way possible at this juncture.

Vice President H. R. Bush presided, and the musical feature of the meeting was arranged by F. L. Fry, chairman of the music committee.

put into operation here. The plan is to reach the largest number of girls in various forms of athletic work.

"It may be well to explain a little more fully the plan as outlined by this association. It is built upon a point system, which allows points for definite work in various forms of athletics. The accumulation of these points permits the girls to win certain monogram honor. The first honor is in the form of a local letter; the next a state monogram. The various activities that are stressed are—swimming, hiking, horseback-riding, basketball, and any other mass games that may be promoted. At present something like 27 schools are members of this association, and are following in a more or less successful way, the outline of the constitution.

"In basketball, the girls of Greensboro high school have numerous games were carried on before the holidays, culminating in the winning of the class pennant. Since that period, two squads have been working regularly with definite scheduled games. They have been under coaches who have guarded their health carefully, because at present, one of the great faults that is being found with basketball is the danger involved when girls play it. The rules of the school state that no one girl may play more than in one full game during the week-end. The coaches are instructed at all times to keep their girls in good physical condition. Physical examinations are required in every case. North Carolina for some years has been enthusiastically supporting girls basketball. The trend of the present day, however, is opposed to inter-school basketball for girls. The effort of the association is to carry out this wise development, and to interest girls in more phases than basketball.

"During last spring a field day was held which reached at least 100 girls in various forms of outdoor sports. A similar event was held during the fall of this year. Plans for the spring field day are being made now.

"Baseball class teams are being organized for girls. Certainly this is a great possibility, even more so than in the type of basketball that has been played.

"There are also in the school at present, 160 girls who are following regulations which include sleeping, eating and other similar habits. These regulations are printed on a card which is supplied to each girl. She makes a report to the teacher in charge as to the success with which she is following it.

"The next statement is one pertaining to expenses. This is covered under two heads—traveling expenses for teams and necessary equipment for the entire program. It is fair to say that the traveling expenses of teams can approximately be cancelled because in the making of a schedule, the effort is made to balance one team against another so that the management can at least come out even. There is no question but what this phase of the work could be handled by the school itself, without asking for outside assistance. It would not be necessary to have as much equipment for simply a show team in these sports.

"Equipment of an athletic nature is very expensive. To equip a football player moderately, safely, it will cost \$25. For basketball, \$12; for baseball, \$20. Baseball bats, balls and other playing balls must also be furnished.

"Expense has been incurred in payment of rentals on the use of the Y. M. C. A. floor and Neese hall. Referees have cost from \$5 to \$20 per game. Basketball goals have had to be made from funds provided by the association.

"Thus it will be seen that equipment for a number of pupils has meant a large item of expense.

"The method of raising funds is as follows: The athletic association of the high school has a plan of 25

**"If We Are Wise, No Power
On Earth Can Prevent" Up-
building Great Institution**

ROTARIANS PLAN TRIP

Greensboro Rotarians at yesterday's meeting welcomed their president, L. J. Duffy, home from his honeymoon, with loud acclaim and an eloquent address to him and to Mrs. Duffy, the club's sentiments in that being voiced by Frederick Archer; heard from President J. I. Foust about the North Carolina college's legislative experiences, and made plans for attendance at the district convention at Charleston two weeks hence.

The club has chartered a Pullman car for this event, which will be used as lodging during the two days of the convention, and will be insufficient to accommodate the Greensboro delegation, according to present indications. Reports from committees in connection with plans for the convention were presented by A. B. Joyner and E. M. Oettinger. Vice President H. R. Bush presided, with more or less support from the bridegroom-president.

President Foust said the college authorities had been greatly discouraged by the budget commission report, which seemed unfair. But the attitude of the general assembly proved to be wonderfully favorable. Eight or 10 years ago if the college got \$50,000 or \$60,000 "we thought we had done exceedingly well," said Dr. Foust.

"If anyone had told me the time would come when a legislature would give the college more than a million dollars I would have thought his thinking equipment was out of gear. The college gets more than two million dollars for the next two years for improvements and maintenance. None spoke of the college in other terms than as the University of North Carolina for her women, none questioned that the women of the state are entitled to the advantages of a great college as the young men are to great university.

"If we are wise at the college, no power on earth can prevent it coming to be the greatest college for women in this whole section," the president continued. "I have never before felt so hopeful or so certain about the college's future as I do today."
