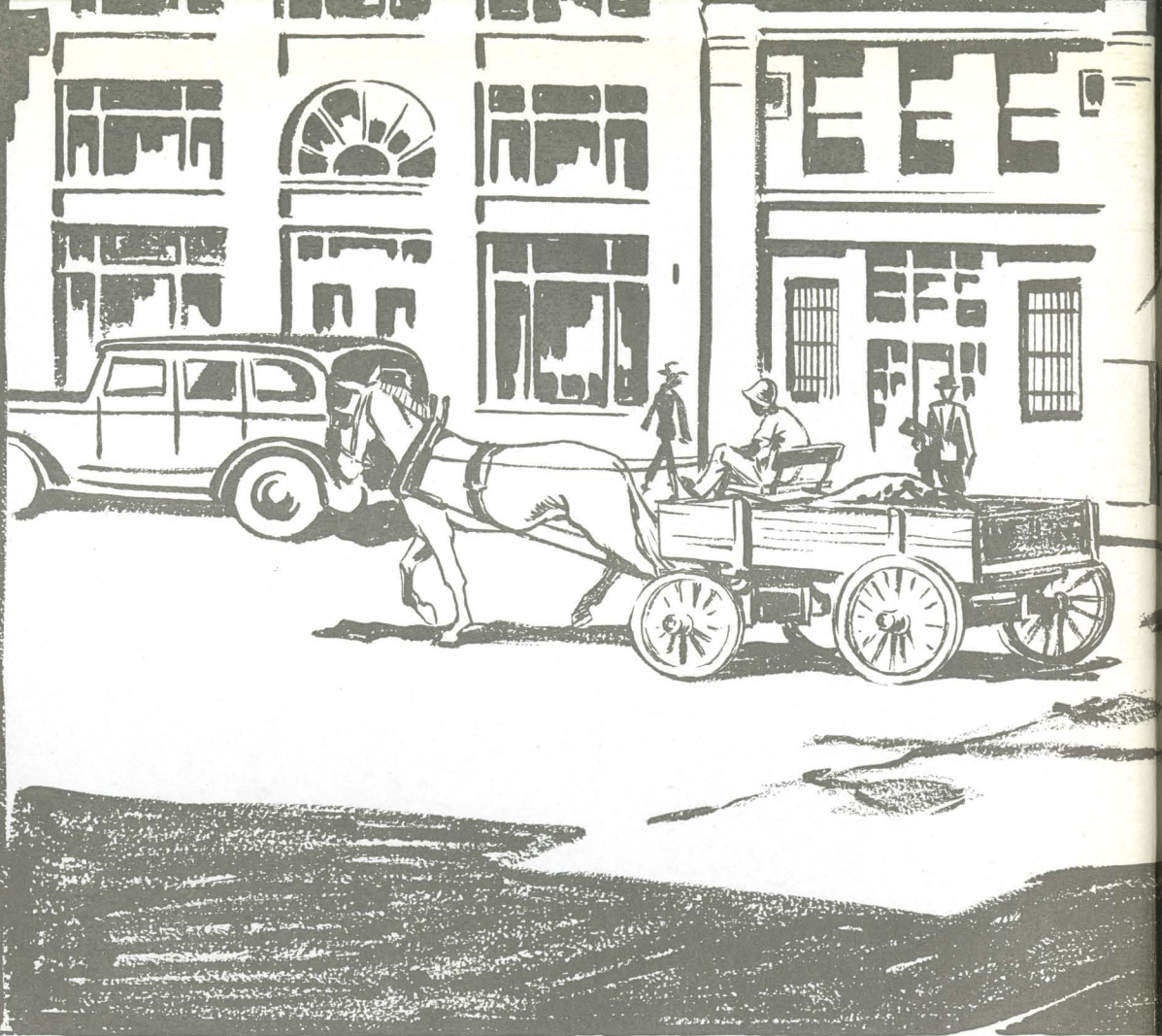
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FOREWORD

TO be baffled, to be awed by the unknown, the mysterious, the strange, has never been gratifying to man, and thus arises his propensity toward inventing explanations of what he does not understand. Motivated by this discomfiture in the presence of the inexplicable, man created the supernatural and, in order to explain events he liked and events he disliked, filled it with two sets of forces, those propitious and those non-propitious to his desires and well-being. As every phase of life and death came to be touched by this supernatural world, so too, the years on down to the present came to be "as Luck would have them."

With Ignorance the Mother of Superstition and Education its Foe, we were interested in looking about on our college campus to ascertain the prevalence of superstitious beliefs and practices. Remarkably enough, although the college has passed through major disasters, such as fires, epidemics, and deaths, we could find no traditional superstition surrounding the institution. With individuals, however, it was a different matter. Out of 769 interviewed, only 160 could definitely declare themselves beyond the influence of this Power so incapacitating to Reason. The superstitions practiced by the other 609 are embodied in some form within the covers of this book, the most prevalent superstitions being illustrated.

THE MARCH OF TIME

Four years:

What an interminable time this seemed to Thirty-three when she first set foot on the campus of N. C. C. W. in the fall of 1929. How bewildered she was in her new surroundings, yet how expectant! The faint touch of homesickness that she experienced as she set up her household gods in this strange environment was pushed far into the background by thoughts of new friendships she would form, the wider experiences she would have.

In spite of the unfamiliarity of her new life, therefore, Thirty-three began her college career by tripping gleefully along in her high-heeled shoes, equally thrilled by freshman examinations, exploring trips about the campus, and daily social events. Figuratively speaking, she found four-leaf clovers every day, and her first letters home reflected the glamor of college life. It was almost too good to be true!

Then disillusionment took a hand and brought her back to earth with something like a thump; and by the end of registration day, when she wearily limped back to her dormitory, romance had given place to realism. She was initiated.

The days came and went, each one bringing new thoughts and new experiences. One of the most impressive occasions was the ceremony which united the class of Blue and White with the class of Red and White. Thirty-three began then to feel that her lucky star was in the ascendancy, for she was no longer alone.

After this rite the scenes shifted rapidly. Interspersed with the monotony of study came the traditional events, the high lights of the year: never before had Thirty-three been so intrigued by anything as by the beauty of the Lantern Festival; never had she had so good a time as when later, in gay-colored hose, she romped g'eeffully through a ridiculous week of work and fun, climaxed by formal initiation into clubs.

The first class election made Rachel Lipscomb president; Margaret Morris, vice-president, and Catherine McIver, secretary-treasurer. A class song was written, and Thirty-three sang it proudly at last mass meeting. So rapidly had the last weeks of the term slipped by, that almost before she realized it, Thirty-three's first year in college had come to a close.

Time marched on!

Vacation ended, and Thirty-three was back at college in the fall of 1930, joyful in the anticipation of renewing old friendships and of taking up forgotten work. A rather sophisticated young lady, imbued with the feeling that she was really an important part of the college, had replaced the naive little freshman of the year before. This was natural, however, as Thirty-three was now living among upper classmen and had a greater share in college activities than ever before.

One of her duties this year was to select a competent staff of officers for the fall semester, and Thirty-three showed her wisdom by choosing Lucile Hutaff as president; Katherine Teague, vice-president; Modena Lewis, secretary; and Virginia Allen, treasurer. Acting on a quality which had already manifested itself, she adopted *Loyalty* as her motto. Later she announced that she had selected Betsey John Hurley, little daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Leonard B. Hurley, as mascot; and Miss Ernestine Welton of the Residence Department as Honorary Member.

Two events of this period stand out very vividly in Thirty-three's memory. The first of these, preceded by weeks of whispered back-stage plans, was the wearing of her newly-arrived blue leather jacket on a triumphal, serenading march through the dining halls. 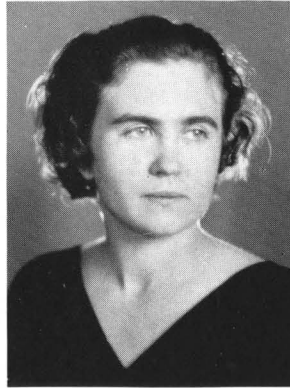

I had the letters all spread out on the study table and had almost finished making my list for Miss Byrd when the postman came. There was but one letter, addressed to "Miss Mary Bailey Williams" in Helene's individual and unreadable handwriting. I tore it open very quickly. It was my lucky day. I had not found a four-leaf clover the afternoon before for nothing. By night Miss Byrd would have the list of every member of the class and just what she was doing. I was anxious to finish that little work.

Helene's letter was short but interesting. She and Arline were living in Greenwich Village. Alumnae House, pictured above, was designed by Mr. Penrose V. Stout, of New York City. The architect drew his inspiration from Homewood, built nearly a century and a half ago by Charles Carroll of Carrollton, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. The original masterpiece stands today on the campus of Johns Hopkins University, and is considered by many critics the most perfect example of Colonial architecture in America.

Alumnae House, which is to be located on the site of Old Guilford Hall, overlooking a garden on the west, will be headquarters for the alumnae and their work. It includes a spacious reception hall with a fireplace, a library, a lounge, a committee room for classes, four bedrooms, a sitting room, a dining alcove and serving pantry, also a second story balcony. Here too, are headquarters for the Student Government Association, a students' organization room with fireplace, and offices for the student publications.

When our dream is a reality, we hope that the alumnae, the faculty, the students, and our friends may meet and mingle here on many a happy occasion.

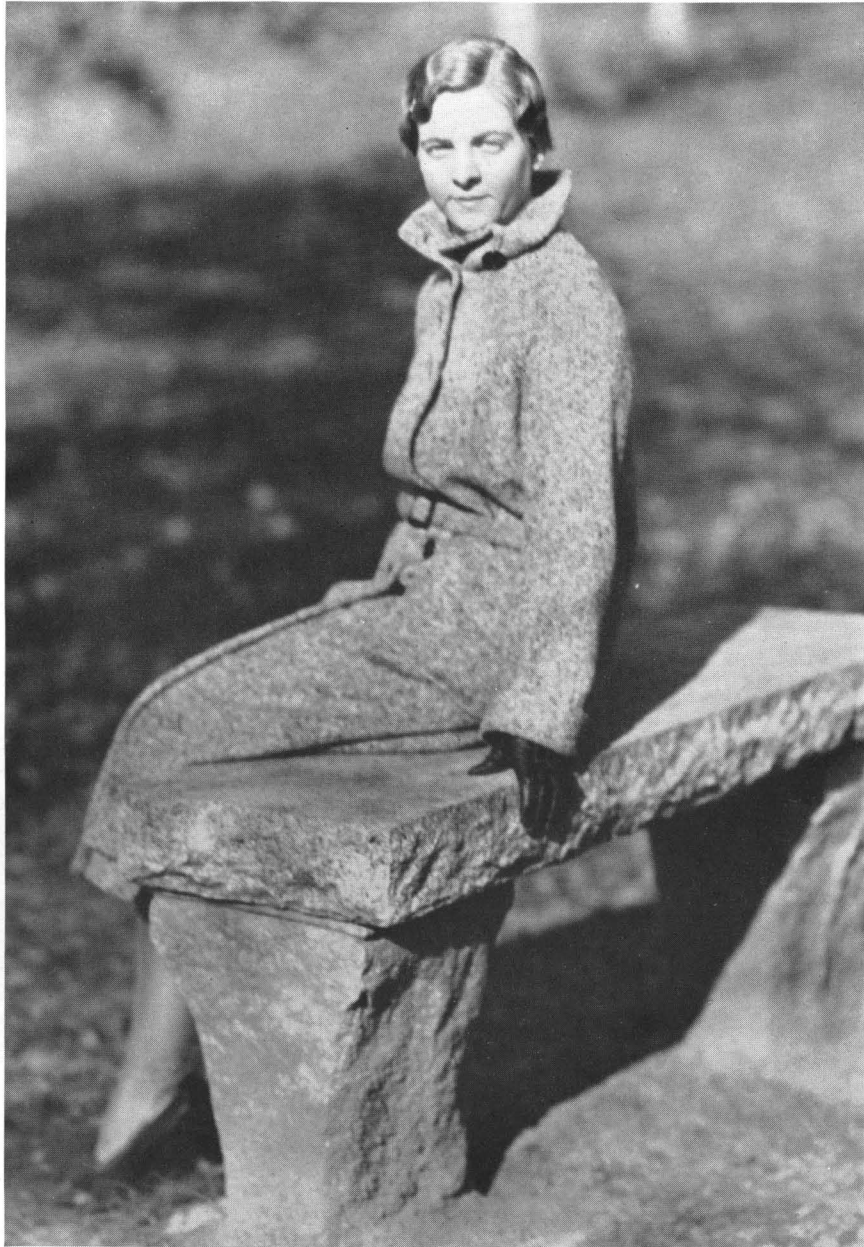

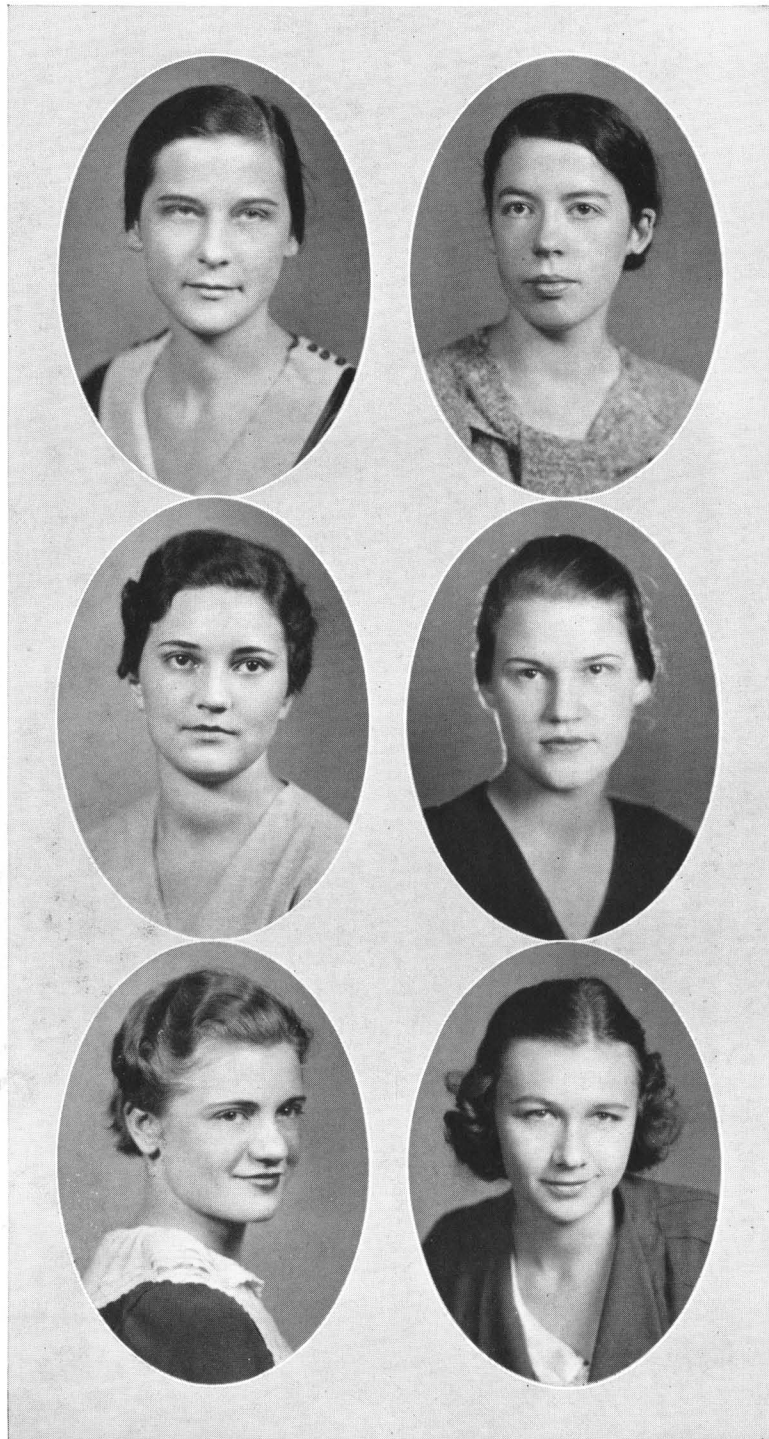

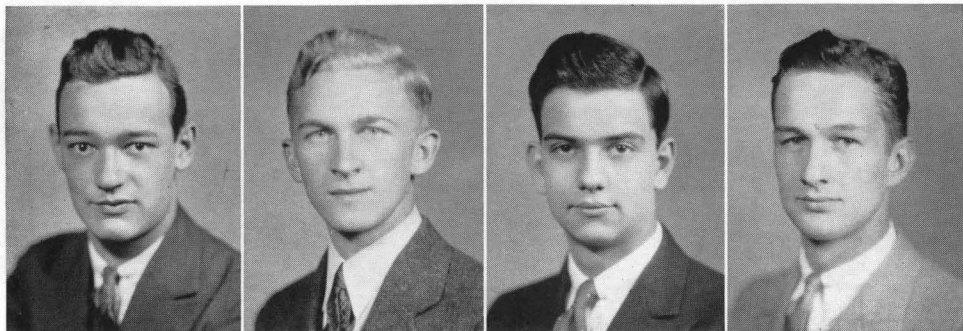

In September, 1932, on the invitation of Doctor Foust, seventy-five men students registered for classes. The doors of the Women's College were opened to them as a depression measure so that the young men of Greensboro and the vicinity might be able to take advantage of the educational facilities of their home town. It is believed now, however, that co-education will be a permanent fixture on the campus. Indeed, some men students have come here from distant places and established a residence in town in order to attend classes at the Woman's College.

Shortly after their matriculation the men organized their Men's Association for the purpose of "dealing with campus problems and administrative relations peculiar to the men students." The association is subsidiary to the Student Government Association and parallels, for the boys, the work of the Girls' Day Students Association.

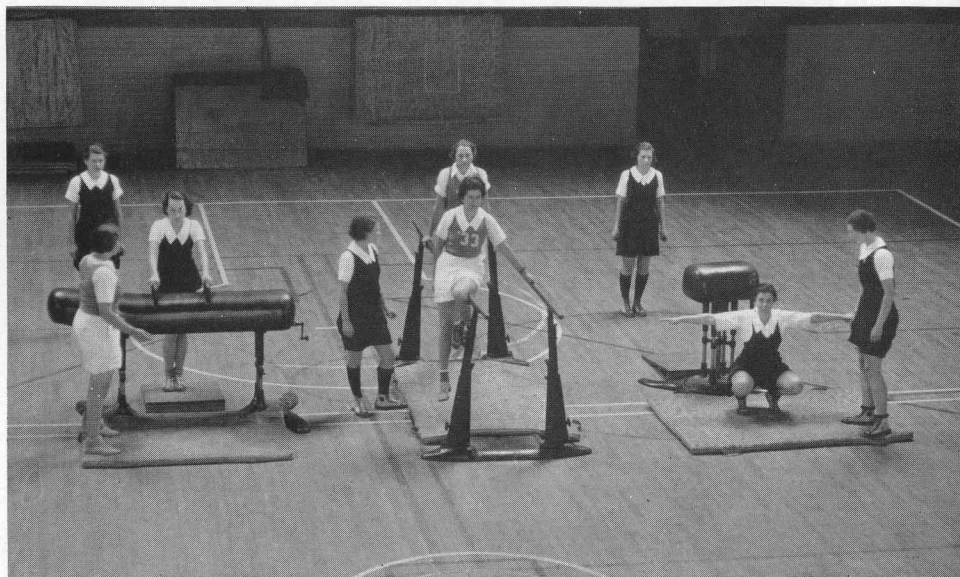


VOLLEY BALL

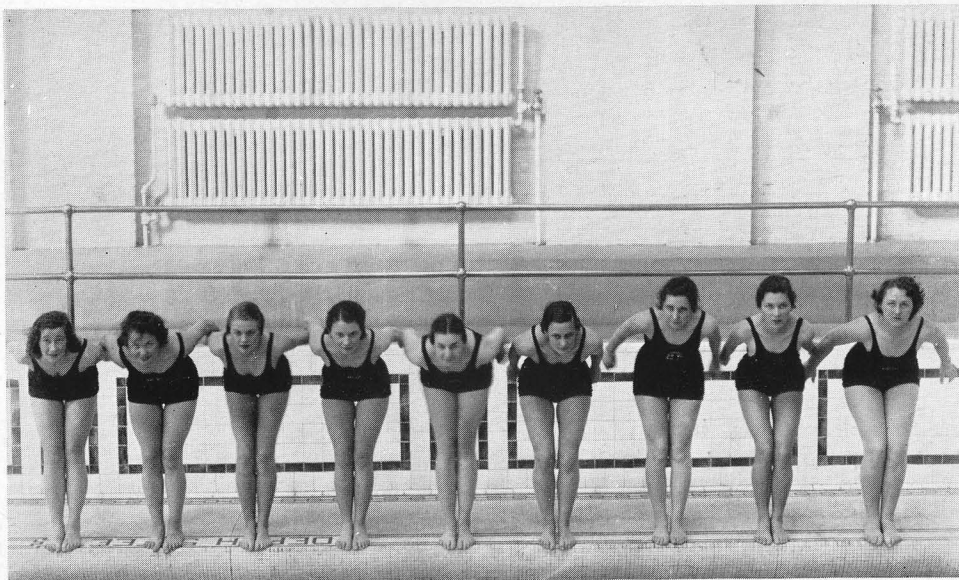


BASKETBALL

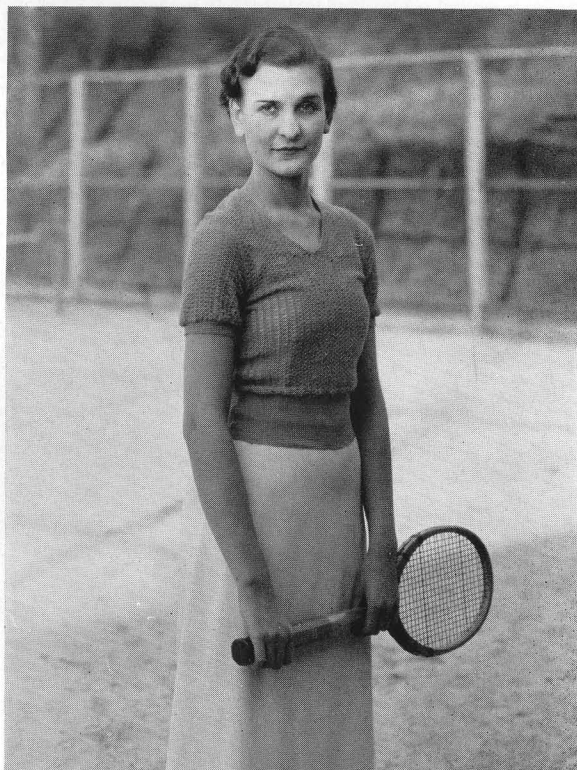
BASEBALL

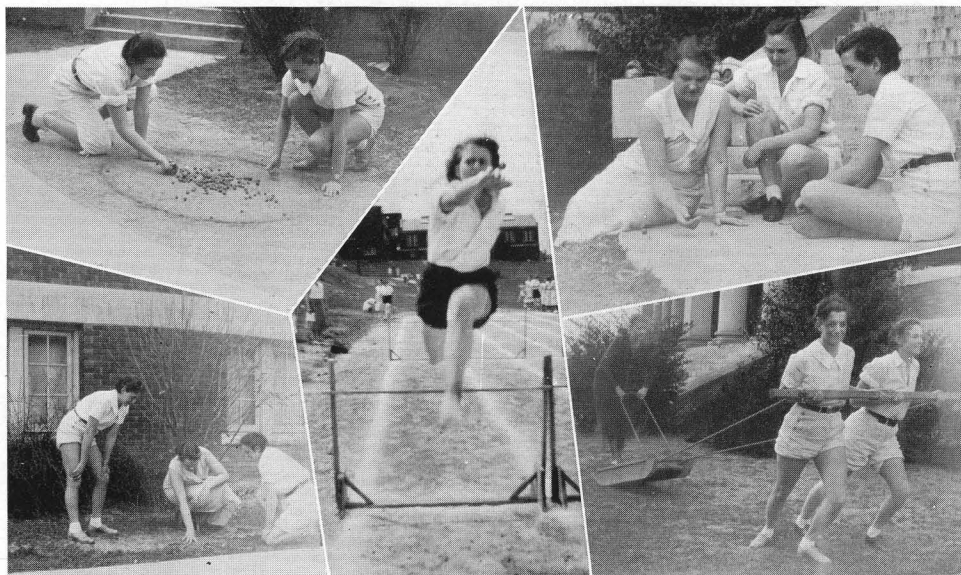
TENNIS

PHOUST ANNOUNCES DRASTIC CHANGES

Discovers Reason Our Girls Have Trouble with Jobs

An interview with Dr. G. Y. Phoust today revealed startling changes contemplated in the curriculum for the fiscal year, 1933-34. 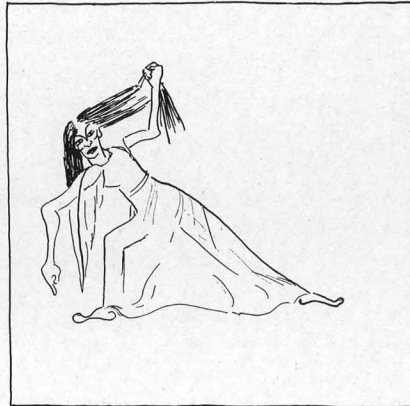
